Jonathan shared a few touching stories from his practice, but one really stood out. "There are 26 million people worldwide that go blind from a completely reversible condition. Cataracts are the leading cause of global blindness, a heart-wrenching fact. What's more, is that a quick 20-minute surgery can reverse cataract-caused blindness completely. Several years ago, a blind man came into my office wheelchair-bound because he was elderly and scared to fall. The day after surgery, he practically ran in; he was beaming. The wheelchair was gone. I remember joking with him about some wild vacation plans that he had come up with. Ophthalmology is as close to magic as I will ever be."

"Day to day, however, most patients come in with complaints driving at night or difficulty seeing the golf ball. That's my job, improving people's swings and helping them to see their grandkids."

Jonathan practices at Florida Eye Microsurgical. He shared his care philosophy: "Medicine should be a collaboration between patient and Physician. There's hardly ever one way to approach a challenge, but the right way always involves putting the patient's goals and comfort first. I also love teaching and empowering my patients through knowledge – this brings peace of mind."

Jennifer has spent her career in the healthcare space as well, but on the industry side. Formally, she worked at Merck on the GARDASIL 9 vaccine team, focused on brand strategy and marketing messaging. She has recently taken on a new role at ADMA Biologics as the Associate

Director of Marketing. ADMA is a biopharmaceutical company that provides FDA-approved immunoglobulin treatments for people who are immune deficient at risk of infection and infectious diseases. "The work is humbling," Jennifer shared. "The company's motto is "Patients are counting on us." And it's true. Hearing patient testimonials first-hand is quite emotional. We are so lucky that a company of this caliber is in our backyard. Actually, I learned of the position through a mutual friend at a neighbor's BBQ... How's that for Florida community!"



The couple also shares a love for tennis, and their move to Florida has brought them back to the game. Jennifer




